



2.) Remove small vacuum hose on top of the TB from the 2 nipples. There are small, one-time clamps on there. (I decided to clip them with a pair of pliers and buy new ones, but you can easily slide them off and reuse them if you choose.)







3.) Remove the electronic sensor below the throttle body hose, just use a flat-head screwdriver and give it a small twist to get the clip to release and disconnect. (note: be gentle with these sensors as the wires connecting them are pretty small/fragile)





4.) Loosen the hose clamp holding the Throttle body hose to the actual throttle body, and gently wiggle the hose off the end of the TB. If its giving you a hard time, slowly turn it back and forth a bit, GENTLY, while pulling, it should come right off.



5.) At this point you can see inside the TB, and are getting closer to actually cleaning it. There will be 4 Allen bolts holding the TB to your intake manifold, they are 5mm. undo these 4 bolts and carefully release the TB from the intake.







BE CAREFUL as there is a gasket between the TB and intake manifold that you dont want to damage/drop/bend. Mine was stuck to the TB itself, you can reuse this gasket or get a new one, your choice. (I chose to re-use mine as it was in decent condition) Just be sure to keep it clean and flat if you plan on re-using it.



6.) Youve finally got the TB out at this point and it is time to start cleaning it. Take your cleaner of choice (I used Gunk throttle body & intake cleaner with great results) and start spraying down the inside of the TB. The carbon build-up should be loosened up at this point and you can use a clean rag/microfiber to get most of the stuff out.




Be careful when cleaning around the butterfly valve as it is a precision piece, it only "tilts" or turns one way, so be sure not to force it to move. it will have a little resistance to get it to open, but dont go he-man on the thing. Clean around the small opening inside by opening the valve and get all that carbon out!




You can also remove the butterfly valve/throttle plate with a T20 torx driver and removing the 2 bolts holding it, for a more in-depth cleaning. I chose not to as it was not necessary and I was able to get practically all the build-up out, without a problem.





7.) After thoroughly cleaning the TB and making sure there is no more cleaner in there, I decided to clean the Intake Air Temperature sensor inside the intake manifold post-TB. To remove this sensor, use the flat-blade screwdriver and unplug it just as you would any other sensor. Next, there is a single 5mm allen bolt holding the sensor into the intake, remove that bolt and gently remove the sensor.







8.) Take electronics cleaner of choice, and spray the sensor down thoroughly. Be gentle with this sensor as it is exposed and wouldnt take much to mess up the small wires running through it. Make sure it is good and dry, and re-install.



9.) At this point, you are pretty much all set to go ahead and re-assemble everything in reverse order, just be sure to get all the cleaner out of the TB and sensors and that everything is nice and dry to avoid and problems.





10.) Before starting the car after re-assembly you need to run a Throttle Body alignment with a VAG-COM. Some people say you can leave the key in the "accessory" position for a minute or 2 and it will re-align itself... I dont know if there is any truth behind this, but I chose not to take a chance and did it through VAG-COM.

In closing, I hope this DIY was helpful to some of you and may have even been able to take care of some of the problems you may have been experiencing. Im sure there are grammatical errors ive missed and I will be "cleaning" up this DIY as time goes on. Please feel free to question/comment on anything, or if you feel like I missed something along the way, please let me know and Ill update accordingly.
